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What is it we discover, much to our relief?

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What is the one short question we need to ask ourselves?

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What are the ‘good reasons’ to believe in a power greater than ourselves?

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On page 52 what should we apply to our human problem, what subjects does the Big Book give as examples?

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What ‘certain kind’ of faith does the Big Book say we already have?

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What idea is deep down in every man woman and child?

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In the story of the atheist what was the turning point in this mans recovery.

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Read Appendix II, Spiritual Experience, write a summary of the differences between a spiritual experience and a spiritual awakening.

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Analyse the four statements below and write a short explanation of each one and how that applies to your own experience.
